According to records at the nearest station, which is located in Ozark, the precipitation for the period of June 16 until August 7 was 1.99 inches of rain. However, we received .22 inches of precipitation for a 40-day period from June 16 until July 26. Some parts of the county has reported more and some have not received any in this time period. The lu-year average for July is approximately 3.5 inches. The temperature for July has been hotter than normal with several days above the 100 degree mark and the high in the 90s every day but one.

Peed normally produced has been reduced due to wet weather; getting approximately 50% of first cutting of alfalfa wet, the second cutting was about normal, the third cutting was about 50% of normal and there will be very few that will get a Fourth cutting. The over-all hay production in the county will can about 35% of normal taking into consideration the quality and quantity. Pasture loss has amounted to about 40% due to hot and dry weather. Corn loss for grain has amounted to about 80% loss due to hot dry weather; however, most of the corn was contact the conditions. Grain sorghum has about a 30% loss due to dry der cormal conditions. Grain sorghum has about a 30% loss due to dry weather. Wheat loss for grain was 66% and 40% loss for silage due to late freeze in March and heavy rains.

Most dairy producers are culling moderate to heavy and reducing grain rations on producing cows as well as replacement heifers; also, feed more hay in the place of grain which they are having to go outside the rea to get. I. Description of Present Disaster (conti.)

Most beef producers do not feed any kind of feed during the period of May until the end of September except for pasture; however, due to the shortage of pasture some producers have grazed their hay fields and will be short on hay this winter; thereby, causing the already short supply of hay to be hard to get this winter and the price to be hillflier.

Hog producers are having to pay high prices for feeding rations due to short corn crop with an increase of 20% in the price from 7-5-74 to 8-26-74 and pig starter increase of 14% for the same period.

Some operators are going out due to high interest rates, low prices on cattle, milk, and hogs, and high input prices. This is harder on the farmer that got in three or four years ago due to feed suppliers and banks cutting off credit and requiring cash for feed and supplies due to low prices for the livestock. The local economy will suffer more in three or four months due to less money being received for products because of lower quality and less money to spend for agricultural inputs.

Producers generally cull about 10% of their herd but are culling about 20% at the present time with more culling in the future if feed does not become available. Most producers are culling mature stock and keeping replacement because they consume less feed. Hog producers are selling a large amount of pigs, sows and more gilts than normal; also, selling ½ finished hogs. Dairy producers are drying cows up 30 to 60 days earlier than normal to save feed.

If this feed program is approved for Christian County it would prevent a lot of farming operations from going out of business due to the financial help and the extra feed supply for their livestock.

If this program is not approved there will be a lot of marginal farmers lose that farming operations due to the drought conditions causing the feed along with other inputs to increase in price.
